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## **PREDETERMINATION/PREDISPOSITION - GUIDANCE**

The Council often has to make controversial decisions that affect people adversely and this can place individual members in a difficult position. They are expected to represent the interests of their constituents and political party and have strong views but it is also a well established legal principle that members who make these decisions must not be biased nor must they have pre-determined the outcome of the decision. This is especially so in “quasi judicial” decisions in planning and licensing committees. This Note seeks to provide guidance on what is legally permissible and when members may participate in decisions. It should be read alongside the Code of Conduct.

### Predisposition

Predisposition is lawful. Members may have strong views on a proposed decision, and may have expressed those views in public, and still participate in a decision. This will include political views and manifesto commitments. The key issue is that the member ensures that their predisposition does not prevent them from consideration of all the other factors that are relevant to a decision, such as committee reports, supporting documents and the views of objectors. In other words, the member retains an “open mind”.

Section 25 of the Localism Act 2011 confirms this position by providing that a decision will not be unlawful because of an allegation of bias or pre-determination “just because” a member has done anything that would indicate what view they may take in relation to a matter relevant to a decision. However, if a member has done something more than indicate a view on a decision, this may be unlawful bias or predetermination so it is important that advice is sought where this may be the case.

### Pre-determination / Bias

Pre-determination and bias are unlawful and can make a decision unlawful. Predetermination means having a “closed mind”. In other words, a member has made his/her mind up on a decision before considering or hearing all the relevant evidence. Bias can also arise from a member’s relationships or interests, as well as their state of mind. The Code of Conduct’s requirement to declare interests and withdraw from meetings prevents most obvious forms of bias, e.g. not deciding your own planning application. However, members may also consider that a “non-pecuniary interest” under the Code also gives rise to a risk of what is called apparent bias. The legal test is: “whether the fair-minded and informed observer, having considered the facts, would conclude that there was a real possibility that the Committee was biased’. A fair minded observer takes an objective and balanced view of the situation but Members who think that they have a relationship or interest that may raise a possibility of bias, should seek advice.

This is a complex area and this note should be read as general guidance only. Members who need advice on individual decisions, should contact the Monitoring Officer.

Members confirmed that they had read and understood the guidance on predetermination and predisposition.

**15. Minutes of the Last Meeting held on 16th November 2022**

**Resolved –** That the minutes of the meeting held on 16<sup>th</sup> November 2022 be approved as a correct record.

**16. Application for a Street Trading Consent - Fastway Food Corner, Land at Bowles House, Blackthorne Road, Poyle**

Following introductions and confirmation that all parties had received a copy of the paperwork, the Chair outlined the procedure for the hearing.

Introduction by the Licensing Officer

The Senior Licensing Officer, introduced the report to the Sub-Committee. An application for a Street Trading Consent had been submitted for the sale of hot food, consisting of burgers, fried chicken and chips, coffee, and tea and that the proposed hours of operation would be Monday to Sunday: 06.00 to 23.00 hours.

The Sub-Committee was advised that three objections to the application had been received, namely from a local business, Slough Borough Council's Parking and Planning teams. In summary, the objections related to:

- Concerns about road conditions and traffic congestion.
- The plans submitted do not reflect what is at the site.
- No parking is available for customers.
- No planning permission.

The Licensing Officer explained that he had carried out various site inspections, at different times of the day, to monitor the flow of traffic and concluded that it was a very busy area especially during the hours 4:30pm to

6:30pm. Members were also informed that there were no car parking facilities at the site. Immediately behind the van there was only concrete land over which HGVs used to enter and exit the site. It was likely that customers would have to park on the pavement which was narrow and likely to cause traffic problems.

### Submissions by the Applicant

The Applicant's husband, Mr Singh, presented the reasons why an application for Street Trading Consent had been submitted. Mr Singh explained the type of food that was proposed to be sold and how it would be prepared.

When addressing the car parking arrangements at the site, Mr Singh explained that there were at least 3 car parking spaces in front of the van and that there were plenty of car parking spaces (almost 8) behind the van. He informed the Sub-Committee that you had applied for planning in 2022 and that it was the Council's Planning Team that advised you to put up barriers around the site that you proposed to trade from. Mr Singh explained that the barriers were not yet in place and that you proposed to do this in the future to create enclosed parking space.

### Questions to the Applicant

Mr Singh confirmed that trading was currently taking place at the site even though Street Trading Consent had not been given. It was explained that when the Council's Health and Safety Team inspected the proposed site and van in February 2023 and awarded you Grade 4 for food and hygiene standard, which the Applicant thought amounted to the Council granting permission to start street trading.

In response to Members question as to how clear the guidelines are in relation to exactly what an applicant needs to apply for before they can start trading, the licensing officer explained that the Council's guidelines are clear and it stated that an applicant needed to consider obtaining the relevant permission from planning, food safety and licensing before they could start trading. It was also highlighted that the Food and Hygiene Team are not able to consider and/or grant license for a premises licence or street trading consent. It was clarified that the Licensing team cannot refuse a trading licence if an applicant does not have planning or food safety certificate/grading.

Responding to the Sub-Committee Member's question, Mr Singh once again explained that his wife was mistaken by the grant of the food and hygiene certificate and believed it to amount to the grant of Street Trading Consent. The Licensing Officer pointed out to Members that there should have been no confusion because he met with Mr Singh in December 2022 and advised on what documents needed to be submitted and that at the time the applicant had an agent who was dealing with her Street Trading Consent application.



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Mr Singh informed Sub-Committee Members that he previously had an agent but as the agent was wrongly advising them they decided to terminate the use of the agent's services and as such, the applicant genuinely did not appreciate that the grant of a food and hygiene certificate did not mean that she could start trading.

### Representations by Responsible Authorities / Interested Party

The Sub-Committee relied on the written representations made by the Council's Highway and Parking Team and a local business in the vicinity of the site location.

### Summing Up

The Licensing Officer reminded Members that the Applicant had started trading without a Street Trading Consent. Mr Idowu drew the Sub-Committee's attention to the fact that in December 2022 he had discussed and advised the Applicant on the steps required to take to obtain a Street Trading Consent and as such, you should not have started trading without the proper consent of the Council in February 2023.

In Mr Singh's closing remark, he stated that he had spoken to neighbours in the immediate vicinity of the site and that they were happy with food being sold at the location. Furthermore, other than objection from one local business, there were no other objections to the application and that everyone they spoke to were of the view that it was good to have the food on site as there were no other food sites in the immediate vicinity of the location.

All parties were asked to leave the meeting whilst the Sub-Committee deliberated.

### Decision

The Sub-Committee carefully considered all the evidence before it and:

**Resolved** – That a Street Trading Consent be granted (for 12 months) for Monday to Sunday 0600 hours to 2300 hours. The consent was subject to the Council's Street Trading Consents standard general conditions.

**1. Summary and Recommendations**

- 1.1 This report sets out Thames Valley Police grounds to review the premise licence for New Bettola Restaurant & Colnbrook Lodge, Meadowbrook Bungalow, Old Bath Road, Slough, SL3 0NZ. The review application has been made in accordance with section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003.

**Recommendations:**

The Sub-Committee is recommended to:

Having had regard to the representations made by all parties, the Sub-Committee must consider appropriate action for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

Where the Sub-Committee considers action is appropriate the statutory options available are:

- (a) Modify the conditions of the premises licence (which includes adding new conditions or any alteration or omission of an existing condition).
- (b) Exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence.
- (c) Remove the designated premises supervisor, for example, because they consider that the problems are the result of poor management.
- (d) Suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months.
- (e) Revoke the licence.

**Reason:** The Licensing Team cannot disregard or overturn a decision made by the Licensing Sub-Committee.

## **2. Report**

### **Introductory paragraph**

- 2.1 As a quasi-judicial body the Sub-Committee is required to consider this matter on its merits and must act reasonably and rationally. The Sub-Committee can only consider relevant factors and must ignore irrelevant factors. The decision must be based on evidence, which logically shows the existence or non-existence of the relevant facts, or the likelihood or the unlikelihood of some future event, the occurrence of which would be relevant. The Sub-Committee must give fair consideration to the contentions of all persons entitled to make representation to them.
- 2.2 The Sub-Committee can consider matters within the report and may also take into account other information provided in support of the application or representations before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.
- 2.3 Members should note that the Sub-Committee is meeting on this occasion solely to perform the role of Licensing Authority. As such Members should disregard the Council's broader policy objectives and role as statutory authority in other contexts. Members must direct themselves to making a determination solely based upon the licensing law, guidance and the Council's related policies and guidance.
- 2.4 Members will be aware of the Council's Code of Conduct which requires them to declare interests. The Code applies to members when considering licensing issues. In addition, as a quasi-judicial body, Members are required to avoid both actual bias and the appearance of bias.

### **Options considered**

- 2.5 Consideration has been given to how the decision sought will help the Council meets its vision and corporate priorities, however the nature of the review application is outside the scope of these priorities.

### **Background**

- 2.6 On 14 March 2023, Thames Valley Police submitted a review application for New Bettola Restaurant & Colnbrook Lodge, Meadowbrook Bungalow, Old Bath Road, Slough, SL3 0NZ, PL4631. The review application is on the grounds that the following licensing objectives are not being met.

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety

- 2.6.1 The full review application is attached at **Appendix A** and the application can be summarised as follows.
- 2.6.2 16 February 2023 – Joint Immigration and Thames Valley Police visit to premises following receipt of intelligence received by Immigration of alleged illegal workers at the premises. During the visit two staff members were detained by Immigration Officers as they had no right to work in the UK and a third person was working in breach of her conditions. GEN40 Licensed Premises Incident Report for 16 February 2023 is attached at **Appendix D**.
- 2.6.3 20 February 2023 – Thames Valley Police wrote to Oltion Mataj, the premises licence DPS for New Bettola Restaurant and Colnbrook Lodge, to attend a meeting at Windsor Police Station on 06 March 2023 to discuss the matter. A copy of the letter is attached at **Appendix E**.
- 2.6.4 04 March 2023 – Witness statement regarding the joint visit to New Bettola Restaurant and Colnbrook Lodge by Thames Valley Police and Immigration received by Debie Pearmain, Thames Valley Police Licensing Officer from Caroline Laird 1876, Assistant Immigration Officer. The Witness Statement dated 04 March 2023 is attached at **Appendix F** and states that 3 arrests were made on 06 March 2023 (1 x entry in breach of a Deportation Oder, 1 x illegal entrant and 1 x working in breach of her allowed occupations with an outstanding asylum claim).
- 2.6.5 06 March 2023 –Meeting held at Windsor Police Station with the Premises’ DPS, Mr Oltion Mataj, to discuss the joint visit to New Bettola Restaurant and Colnbrook Lodge by Thames Valley Police and Immigration. The meeting notes are attached at **Appendix G**.
- 2.6.6 At the meeting Mr Mataj confirmed he did not make any checks before employing these persons although he had asked for the documents and was going to check at the end of the month when staff are paid. Mr Mataj admitted and apologised for this mistake.
- 2.6.7 06 March 2023 – Email received by the Licensing Team from Arta Nerguti, sole director of Premises Licence Holder Su Kokku Ltd, authorising the DPS Oltion Mataj ‘to take care of anything in need’ in respect of PL4631 New Bettola Restaurant and Colnbrook Lodge. . A copy of the email authorisation is attached at **Appendix H**.
- 2.6.8 15 March 2023 – the statutory notice for the review was published on the Slough Borough Council website in the Representation – Slough Borough Council information pages and also displayed at the premises.

### 3. **Implications of the Recommendation**

#### 3.1 **Financial implications**

- 3.1.1 There are no financial implications to the Council.

## 3.2 Legal implications

3.2.1 The Sub-Committee must have regard to the Secretary of State's Revised guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and in particular, Chapter 11 - Reviews. Particular regard should be had to paragraphs 11.24-11.27 (Reviews arising in connection with crime), which includes the following:

*"11.25 Reviews are part of the regulatory process introduced by the 2003 Act and they are not part of criminal law and procedure. There is, therefore, no reason why representations giving rise to a review of a premises licence need be delayed pending the outcome of any criminal proceedings. Some reviews will arise after the conviction in the criminal courts of certain individuals, but not all. In any case, it is for the licensing authority to determine whether the problems associated with the alleged crimes are taking place on the premises and affecting the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where a review follows a conviction, it would also not be for the licensing authority to attempt to go beyond any finding by the courts, which should be treated as a matter of undisputed evidence before them.*

*11.26 Where the licensing authority is conducting a review on the grounds that the premises have been used for criminal purposes, its role is solely to determine what steps should be taken in connection with the premises licence, for the promotion of the crime prevention objective. It is important to recognise that certain criminal activity or associated problems may be taking place or have taken place despite the best efforts of the licence holder and the staff working at the premises and despite full compliance with the conditions attached to the licence. In such circumstances, the licensing authority is still empowered to take any appropriate steps to remedy the problems. The licensing authority's duty is to take steps with a view to the promotion of the licensing objectives and the prevention of illegal working in the interests of the wider community and not those of the individual licence holder.*

*11.27 There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises:*

- for employing a person who is disqualified from that work by reason of their immigration status in the UK."*

3.2.2 The Sub-Committee must also have regard to the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2019-2024.

- 3.5.2 When determining the case and considering imposition of conditions the Sub-Committee must be satisfied that any decision which interferes with the rights of the applicant or of others, only does so insofar as it is necessary to protect the rights of others and that no alternative decision would be appropriate.
- 3.5.3 The Sub-Committee is specifically referred to the following Convention rights:
- (i) Article 6 (the right to a fair trial),
  - (ii) Article 8 (the right to respect for private and family life)
  - (iii) Article 1 of the First Protocol (the protection of property)

This application to review this premises licence is necessary, as Thames Valley Police believe that the Crime and Disorder Licensing Objective and Public Safety Licensing Objectives have been undermined.

I have detailed below the incident/visit and meetings relevant to this premises below:

16/02/2023 - 8.000m

Joint Immigration and Thames Valley Police Licensing visit. Joint visit planned due to intelligence received by Immigration of alleged illegal workers at this premises.

During the visit two staff members were detained by Immigration Officers as they had no right to work in the UK and the third person was working in breach of her conditions.

I conducted a Licensing inspection with [REDACTED] the General Manager. I was informed by [REDACTED] that the DPS, Mr Olton Mataj was away on holiday, returning back to work on the 28<sup>th</sup> February 2023.

No Premises Summary was being displayed.

No written authorisation was in place.

CCTV checked with date and time being correct.

No other staff member apart from the DPS is able to download CCTV.

Before we left the premise I updated Olga of the situation and that the staff members were being dealt with by Immigration Officers.

This is his Premises Licence and he must not be undermining any of the four Licensing Objectives. Due to these staff members not having the relevant checks completed on them by the Premise Licence Holder and DPS, Thames Valley Police believe that the Management of this premises, have complete disregard for the law.

Thames Valley Police believe that due to this failure, the Crime and Disorder and the Public Safety Licensing Objectives have been undermined.

DPS or nominated person is responsible in supplying the necessary media (discs, data stick) containing any downloaded content.

If the CCTV equipment fails, the Police and the Licensing Authority will be informed immediately by telephone and immediate steps will be taken to put the equipment back into working order.

In the absence of the Designated Premises Supervisor a Personal Licence Holder to be on the premises during the sale of alcohol.

Refusals Register to be in place, kept up to date and made available upon request of Thames Valley Police, Trading Standards or Slough Borough Council Licensing Officers.

Before any person is employed at the premises sufficient checks will be made to ensure they are legally entitled to employment in the UK.

The Premises Licence Holder shall keep and maintain all right to work documents for all staff members. Right to work documents shall be kept at the premises and produced to Thames Valley Police and authorised Officers of Slough Borough Council.

The Licensing Sub Committee to issue a 'Yellow card' to the licensed premises as a warning that if a further review is necessary and matters have not improved the Premises Licence may be revoked. A 'Yellow card' will be clearly and visibly displayed at the Premises for a period of 12 months detailing the imposition of new conditions on the Premises Licence and that this warning has been given.

AUTHORISATION OF ALCOHOL

The supply or sale of alcohol is prohibited when:

- (a) at a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence
- (b) at a times when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence has been suspended

In addition every supply of alcohol must be made or authorised by a person who holds a Personal Licence

Condition 1, with effect 6<sup>th</sup> April 2010

1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children-

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-

(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

(ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;

(d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on-

(i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or

(ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;

(e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.

Condition 2, with effect 6<sup>th</sup> April 2010

The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

Condition 3, with effect 6<sup>th</sup> April 2010

The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

Condition 4, with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> October 2010

(1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

Condition 5, with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> October 2010

The responsible person shall ensure that-

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-

- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and

(b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours the consumption of alcohol on the premises;
- (b) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;

No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:

- (1) He is the child of the holder of the Premises Licence
- (2) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there
- (3) He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or egress

I am an Immigration Officer, working as part of the SOUTH CENTRAL ICE immigration enforcement team, which is based at [REDACTED]

On Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> February 2023, I led an enforcement visit to New Bettola, Colnbrook Lodge, Old Bath Road, Colnbrook, SL3 ONZ. Officers from Thames Valley Police were also in attendance with us. Entrance to the premise was gained via Section 179 of Licensing Act 2003 at approx. 20:03 we carried out this visit to locate and process any identified immigration offenders.

On arrival I asked a male who I had observed working behind the pizza oven area who was in charge, he directed me to the manager to enable me to advise her of why we were there, and what our intentions would be during the time we are at the restaurant.

This lady confirmed her name as [REDACTED] of ROMANIAN nationality. She confirmed that she was in charge, but when asked later stated that she was not in charge of employment and that it was the responsibility of the owner.

She stated that he was currently out of the country, so we were unable to ask him further questions regarding the employees found to be working illegally.

The male who was first encountered ([REDACTED]) ALBANIAN nationality was evasive with officers, and was unwilling to co operate when asked questions at first. He later on admitted to entering the UK illegally in 2016.

There was a further 2 arrests made by Immigration Officers for employees working with no right to do

so in the UK.

In total 3 arrests were made (1x entry in breach of Deportation Order, 1x illegal entrant and 1x Working in Breach of her allowed occupations with an outstanding Asylum claim)

All arrested persons have an Albanian nationality with 2x being detained and 1x being walked off of the address and warned she is not to be working outside of her permitted occupations.

At around 22:05 all officers departed the address, and the manager was given a Referral Notice to advise that due to illegal working being found a Civil Penalty will be considered by Home Office's Civil Penalty team.

This is an accurate record of events, where the interview was recorded on the Home Office Pronto mobile application. I'm writing this statement on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> March.

Licensing meeting held at Windsor Police Station with Mr Oltion Mataj, DPS, Melanie Sagar, Senior Licensing Officer, SBC, Sergeant Gray and Debie Pearmain, Police Licensing Officer.

Meeting held to discuss the recent joint visit with Immigration to the premises on the 16<sup>th</sup> February 2023.

We were informed that the Premises Licence Holder is the wife of the DPS, [REDACTED] and she is the Sole Director. The Gen40 of the visit was read out by Debie, concluding that 2 illegal workers were detained by Immigration Officers and 1 worker who had breached her work VISA was walked off the premises by Immigration Officers.

The DPS was then asked what process he has in place for checking his staff's right to work. He informed us that he needed staff and no checks had been done, he admitted that he hadn't been very careful and apologised for this mistake. During discussions he then informed us that he had asked for the paperwork and was going to wait until the end of the month when they got paid. He then informed us that he had a 1 year old child and his wife was pregnant and that he works and contributes and pays his taxes. He didn't do this on purpose.

Melanie informed him that checking staffs documents is a legal requirement. Debie also stated that every business who employs staff has to check their staff, this is the law.

Debie informed the DPS that due to the Immigration issues found during the visit, the Crime and Disorder and Public Safety Licensing Objectives had been undermined.

Debie then informed Mr Mataj that due to the findings at the premises she would be applying to review the Premises Licence and would also be requesting extra conditions be added to the Licence.

Melanie informed Mr Mataj that she would email him again with details of how to request a replacement Premises Licence and this was for the Premise Licence Holder (his wife) to respond back to her.

Additionally, I note that the 2022 annual premises licence fee due 17 October 2022, remains outstanding and I therefore attach a notice of suspension for the licence holder's urgent attention.
