4th August 2011

Test Purchase operation – bottle of Bulmers original cider was sold by Mr Tarluk Singh Kapoor who is not a personal licence holder to a 16 year old male. No identification was requested or age asked by Mr Kapoor. Police concern that Mr Kapoor could not communicate very well in English when spoken to on the night of the test purchase. Another member of staff had to interpret what we was being said to him. Concern as to how Mr Kapoor could challenge persons who were either drunk or under aged.

8th August 2011

Appointment letter sent by Debie Pearmain, Police Licensing Officer to attend Windsor Police Station on 18th August 2011.

18th August 2011

Meeting with Mr Chopra, Owner and DPS, Rachael Rumney, Senior Licensing Officer and Debie Pearmain, Police Licensing Officer. Mr Chopra was informed that due to the failed test purchase Thames Valley Police would be applying to review the premises licence. I also asked Mr Chopra how long the CCTV footage was kept for and he was unsure. I reminded Mr Chopra that there was a condition on the licence clearly stating that CCTV was to be kept for 31 days. Advice given to ensure that this is the case. Mr Chopra was also informed that information had been received from the Town Centre Sergeant that he had observed a drunken male lying on the footpath directly outside his shop, quite clearly drunk and still drinking alcohol. It was believed that he had purchased the alcohol from this shop.

Mr Chopra must take responsibility and be showing due diligence as far as possible. He and his staff should be fully committed in trying to stop the sale of alcohol to under aged persons and drunken persons and not undermine the licensing objectives.

Thames Valley Police request the following amendments and conditions are made to this premises licence:

Sale of Alcohol for consumption off the premises to be reduced to 11.00pm.

Sale of Alcohol to be reduced to 09.00am.

The premises licence is suspended for a period to be decided by the Committee for staff training to be completed and for CCTV to be checked to ensure that it is working and nominated person is able to download any footage, during this period.

In the absence of the DPS a Personal Licence Holder to be on the premises during the sale of alcohol.

Two members of staff to be on the premises each evening from 6.00pm until close.

Challenge 21 policy to be in place.

DPS or nominated person to be trained on how to work the CCTV system to the standard where the nominated person can download any potential evidence required by Thames Valley Police or relevant Agencies.

To participate in Bottlewatch if requested by Police or Trading Standards.

The applicant and their staff are able to converse with customers, the public and representatives of Statutory Agencies to a level that satisfies Police and Trading Standards they are able to meet the four licensing objectives.

The Premises Licence Holder or Designated Premises Supervisor shall ensure staff receives training on a regular basis in relation to the four licensing objectives contained within the Licensing Act 2003 for those authorised to sell alcohol. Written proof of all training shall be recorded and maintained.

All persons trained to sell alcohol shall be trained to the BIIAB Level 1 award in Responsible Alcohol Retailing (ARAR).

The Designated Premises Supervisor or nominated person to attend the local Town Centre Pubwatch scheme where in existence.

No single cans to be sold.

The Licensing Sub Committee to issue a 'Yellow card' to the licensed premises as a warning that if a further Review is necessary and matters have not improved the Premises Licence may be revoked. A 'Yellow card' will be clearly and visibly displayed at the Premises for a period of 12 months detailing the imposition of new conditions on the Premises Licence and that this warning has been given.

Tamper Proof Labels Drinks Bottle Labels

Underage drinking and the associated Anti-Social Behaviour is a growing problem in the UK, stretching already stretched Police Forces to the limit. Not only that it's also draining the NHS with a growing number of diseases associated with heavy drinking. This is why the Government has set about trying to tackle the problem; however Police Forces have tried various methods in combating the problem with no success. That is until PC Andrew Jackson from Northumbria Police took up the challenge. Working alongside SURE Northumbria implemented the **Bottle Watch** Scheme for the first time in 2006 proving an overnight success solving Newcastle Upon Tyne's underage drinking problem.



How BottleWatch Works?

A number of retails collaborate and work together, aiming to tackle Underage Drinking and the resulting ASB etc. One central organisation e.g. The Police or County Council buys a number of Bottle Wacth Tamper Proof labels which come in either a different colour or number to identify each shop involved in the scheme. (e.g. Asda=1 Threshers=2 Sainsburys=3 etc.)

The most successful Bottle Watch schemes charge a small deposit for each marked bottle of say 50p, which is refunded when the bottle is returned. This combats and dramatically reduces the number of broken bottles and litter on the streets as people wish to get their deposit back and helps prevent people attempting to peel the labels off the bottle!

Whenever a broken bottle or underage drinker is found, simiply look at the bottle and the tamper proof Bottle Watch sticker that is attached. This will identify the EXACT shop where the alocohol was bought, and let you know who is selling alochol illegally or who sold alcohol to someone that gave it to a minor! You could also point out exactly which till operator sold the alcohol by simply writing the till number on the sticker when the alcohol was bought!
