

## **SLOUGH BOROUGH COUNCIL**

### **THE BOROUGH OF SLOUGH WAITING RESTRICTIONS AND PARKING PLACES (CONSOLIDATION) ORDER 2017 (AMENDMENT No. 17) EXPERIMENTAL ORDER 2021 (Order 3 of 2021)**

**Section 9 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and Regulation 22 of the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996.**

1. SLOUGH BOROUGH COUNCIL gives notice that on 21<sup>st</sup> January 2021 it made an experimental Order under section 9 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (“the Act”) and any other enabling powers.
2. The effects of the Order will be to amend the existing parking restrictions in Elmhurst Road, Langley, as follows:-
  - (a) to extend the existing “no waiting or loading at any time” restrictions at the western end of Elmhurst Road by 1.4 metres on the north side of the road and by 24.6 metres on the south side;
  - (b) to introduce an 8.5 metre length of “no waiting or loading at any time” on the north side of Elmhurst Road to the west of No. 1A;
  - (c) to introduce a “permit holders only” restriction in place of the “no waiting at any time” outside Nos 1 and 1A Elmhurst Road;
  - (d) to introduce a 20 metre length of short-stay parking (30 minutes maximum, no return within 2 hours, 8am-8pm on any day) on the north side of Elmhurst Road adjacent to the rear of No. 250 High Street, Langley; and
  - (e) to retain the existing parking restrictions in the remainder of the road.
3. The Order will come into operation on 5<sup>th</sup> February 2021 and remain in force for a period not exceeding 18 months.

## Elmhurst Road Experimental TRO Notice

5. The Council will be considering in due course whether to replace this experimental Order with a permanent one having the same effects. Anyone wishing to object to such a permanent Order may do so within six months of the day on which the experimental Order came into force. Any such objection must be submitted in writing, stating the grounds on which it is made, and be sent to the address below or emailed to [tfslough@slough.gov.uk](mailto:tfslough@slough.gov.uk)
6. Any person wishing to question the validity of the Order, or of any provision contained in it, on the grounds that it is not within the powers conferred by the Act, or that any requirement of the Act or of any regulations made under the Act has not been complied with may, within 6 weeks from the date on which the Order was made, apply to the High Court for that purpose.
