
Poverty in Slough







About this document

This document has been created to provide high-level insight on poverty in Slough and the residents who are most at risk of poverty. It is intended to be a tool to support the council in the development of our strategies and evidence-based decision making.

This document should be used alongside other key sources of information, such as the <u>Slough Insights data pack</u> (which provides insight on a wider range of topics), resident consultations, and other service-level sources of data.

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National Trends

According to national profiling of those whose income was persistently low or in poverty, those who are on low incomes are more likely to fall in the following groups:

Age and sex

- Single parents with children, noting women are more likely than men to be single parents (90%).
- Children in families where no one was working.
- Children in families with 3 or more children.
- Children under 5, especially in larger families.

Ethnicity

 Asian/Asian British heads of household and Black/African/Caribbean/Black British heads of household.

Disability

- Adults with limiting health conditions or who are disabled.
- Families living with disabled children.
- Unpaid carers were 50% more likely to be in poverty.

Pregnancy and maternity

Earnings are impacted negatively during and after pregnancy.

Religion or belief

- Muslim people had the lowest percentage of people aged 16 to 64 years in employment.
- This resulted from the high percentages of people who were students or looking after home or family in this group.

Sexual orientation

• Recent longitudinal research highlights the ways that Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual people may be more likely to face income inequalities.

Gender identity

• There is less research on people whose gender is different from that registered at birth, but there is research that people may struggle with housing and (based on London data) live in deprived areas.

Other groups

• Those in social housing.

Key points for Slough

People in poverty in Slough tend to be from the following groups:

Children aged 0-15

- Over a quarter of residents in social rented homes are children.
- A quarter of residents living in deprived households are children.
- A third of Slough's children live in overcrowded homes.
- 24% of Slough's children aged 0-19 live in relative low-income families.

Single parents

 Slough has a higher percentage of recipients of the single with children entitlement of Universal Credit.

Families with dependent children

 Slough has a higher percentage of recipients of the child entitlement of Universal Credit.

Women

- Almost a third of Slough's women were economically inactive in 2021.
- Single parents are more likely to be women.
- Pregnancy and maternity affect income.
- Slough Adult Social Care has higher activity with female residents.
- 53% of residents aged 65 and over are women, which intersects with older people being at more risk of poverty.

Asian ethnic groups

- Slough has a much higher percentage of residents from Asian ethnic groups receiving Universal Credit than England.
- 46% of residents living in deprived households are from Asian ethnic groups. Just under a guarter are Pakistani.
- Half of Slough's children aged 0-15 are from Asian ethnic groups, which intersects with children and parents with dependent children being more at risk of poverty.

Older people aged 65 and over

- Slough has a higher percentage of older people receiving pension credit than England.
- Just over a quarter of Sloughs' older residents live alone.
- Over a third of Slough's older residents are disabled.
- The highest Slough Adult Social Care activity rate is by older residents, especially female residents.

Deprivation in wards

• There are particularly severe pockets of deprivation in Britwell, Chalvey, Herschel Park, Elliman, Wexham Court, and Colnbrook & Poyle.




Protected Characteristics

Basic demographic data on the nine protected characteristics: age, ethnicity, religion or belief, sex, gender reassignment, sexual orientation, marital & civil partnership status, disability, and pregnancy & maternity.

Age

Slough's average age is 35, compared to 41 for the South East and England.

Slough has the second largest proportion of children aged 15 and under in England and Wales, behind only Barking and Dagenham.






Ethnicity

Broad ethnic groups

46.7% of Slough's population are from Asian ethnic groups and 36.0% are from White ethnic groups.


Slough has a larger proportion of residents from Asian ethnic groups and smaller proportion of residents from White ethnic groups than the England average.



In 2021, 45.5% of Slough's HRPs were from White ethnic groups and 39% were from Asian ethnic groups (England: 85.7% from White ethnic groups and 6.9% from Asian ethnic groups.)

Household Reference Person (HRP) replaced Head of Household. They are usually* the household member who owns the accommodation or is legally responsible for the rent.

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
Notes:

- *The ONS defines the Household Reference Person (HRP) as: "the householder, who is the household member who owns the accommodation; is legally responsible for the rent; or occupies the accommodation as reward of their employment, or through some relationship to its owner who is not a member of the household. If there are joint householders, the one with the highest income is the HRP. If their income is the same, then the eldest one is the HRP."
- HRPs provide an individual within a household to act as a reference point for producing further statistics or characterising a household according to the characteristics of the reference person.



Religion or belief

81.6% of Slough's residents identified with a religion or belief, compared to 57.3% for England.

Notes:

- The marriage and civil partnership data only applies to residents aged 16 or over.
- Data Quality Info: The ONS has noted that the census response data contained "implausibly high numbers of people reporting to be in opposite-sex civil partnerships and same-sex marriages". They have corrected most of these apparent errors by using information from the relationship matrix question on the census questionnaire. However, this correction is not possible where people do not live with their current or ex-partner. This means the ONS considers estimates for the legal partnership status "Separated",



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"Divorced/dissolved", and "Widowed/surviving partners" to be reliable, however, the disaggregation of those groups by opposite- and same-sex partnerships is not. Therefore, these groups are not separated into opposite- and same-sex partnerships in the published data.





- This section uses non-standardised data for the first table (Slough only) and age-standardised data for the graph and second table (Slough & England).
 When comparing between geographical areas, the ONS recommends using age-standardised proportions.
- ¹Age Standardisation: Disability is closely related to the age of a population (e.g., it is typically more common in older populations). This can make it difficult to compare areas with different population age structures (e.g., is

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there a genuine difference in health or is the difference due to a higher number of young people in one group?). To overcome this, the ONS has provided age-standardised proportions. Age-standardisation mathematically adjusts the data to have the same age structure as a "standard population" for both groups, allowing for comparisons. Pregnancy and maternity


The Total Fertility Rate for Slough was 1.93 in 2023, which is higher than the rate for England (1.44).

There were 2,268 live births in 2022/23.

The number of 0–4-year-olds in Slough decreased by 7.9% from 2011 to 2021. However, Slough still had a higher percentage of 0–4-year-olds than England in 2021 (Slough: 7.4%, England: 5.4%).

The number of 0–4-year-olds in Slough is estimated to have decreased again by 1.5% between the 2021 census and 2023 population estimates.

Pregnancy increases the risk of poverty. Slough's higher than average fertility rate and proportion of babies means more babies and parents are at risk of poverty.

Note: The ONS defines Total Fertility Rate (TFR) as "the average number of live children that a group of women would have if they experienced the age-specific fertility rates for the calendar year in question throughout their childbearing lifespan.


It is a better measure of trends than the number of live births, since it accounts for the size and age structure of the female population of childbearing age. The rate provides a timely measure of fertility levels and can be affected by changes in the timing of childbearing, completed family size, and the population structure."

Pregnancy and maternity: ethnicity

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Slough had a much larger proportion of babies aged under 1 year from Asian ethnic groups (48.1%) than England (12.2%) in 2021.

This intersects with Asian ethnic groups having a higher chance of poverty, which means these babies and parents are at higher risk of poverty.

Children and Parents

Single parents with dependent children

In 2021, there were 4,429 single parent households with dependent children.

- This was 8% of all Slough households and 19% of households with dependent children (England: 7% and 24%).
- 48.8% of these single parent households (2,162 households) had one dependent child and 51.2% (2,267) had two or more dependent children.

Slough had a higher proportion of single parent households receiving Universal Credit than the national average in 2024 (Slough: 11.94% of all households receiving UC, England: 7.85%).

Couples with children

In 2021, there were 14,431 single family households consisting of a couple with dependent children.

- This was 27.5% of all Slough households and 62.3% of all households with dependent children (England: 18.9% and 66.3%).
- 37.3% of these (5,387 households) had one dependent child and 62.7% (9,044) had two or more dependent children.
- 12,606 of these were a married or civil partnership couple. 4,562 of these married or civil partnership couples had one dependent child and 8,044 had two or more.
- 1,825 of these were a cohabiting couple. 825 of these cohabiting couples had one dependent child and 1,000 had two or more.

Other households with children

In 2021, there were 4,298 households of "other"* composition types with dependent children.

- This was 8.2% of all Slough households and 18.6% of households with dependent children (England: 2.7% and 9.4%).
- 39.9% of these (1,717 households) had one dependent child and 60.1% (2,581) had two or more dependent children.

Children in low-income families

Relative low-income families

In 2024, 23.77% of children aged 0-19 in Slough were in relative low-income families before housing costs (England: 22.17%).

- 21.11% of children in relative low-income families were in out-of-work families (England: 31.17%).
- 38.39% children in relative low-income families were in single parent families (England: 51.91%).

Absolute low-income families

In 2024, 20.59% of children aged 0-19 in Slough were in absolute low-income families before housing costs (England: 19.18%).

- 25.30% of children in absolute low-income families were in out-of-work families (England: 31.87%).
- 37.91% of children in absolute low-income families were in single parent families (England: 50.87%).

Workless households

In 2023, there were 1,900 workless households with dependent children in Slough.

• There were 4,100 children under 16 in these workless households.

Children in large families

In 2021, there were 13,892 households in Slough with two or more children.

• This was 26.5% of all households and 60% of all households with dependent children (England: 16% and 56.1%).

In 2021, there were 19,183 children aged 0-15 living in households consisting of 5 or more people.

• 5 people: 8,227 children (20.8% of children)

• 6 people: 5,161 children (13%)

• 7 people: 2,445 children (6.2%)

• 8 or more people: 3,350 children (8.5%)

Children under 5

In the 2021 census, there were 11,772 children aged 4 and under in Slough.

In 2023, there were estimated to be 11,668 children aged 4 and under in Slough.

Slough has a higher percentage of households receiving Universal Credit for the child entitlement than the national average (Slough: 17.36%, England: 10.63%).

Children 0-15: protected characteristics

The following protected characteristics data is for children in Slough aged 0-15 (and comparisons) from the <u>2021 Census</u>.

Sex

49.2% of Slough children aged 0-15 were female and 50.8% were male.

Disability


4.4% of Slough children aged 0-15 were disabled under the Equality Act.

This is compared to:

- 10.3% of Slough residents aged 16-64 (working age).
- 36.3% of Slough residents aged 65 and over.
- 6.3% of England's children aged 0-15.



Slough has a much smaller percentage of children from White ethnic groups and larger percentages of all other ethnic groups, especially Asian ethnic groups, than England.



Children's health

- Infant mortality rate: 8.1 (England: 4.1).
- Child mortality rate (1-17 years): 14.3 (England: 10.4).
- 3.7% of Slough's term babies have low birth weight (under 2,500g) (England: 2.9%).
- 25.7% of Slough's children in year 6 are obese (England: 22.1%).
- 34.9% of 5-year-olds have experience of visually obvious dental decay (England: 23.7%).

Older People

Older people (aged 65 and over)

Slough has a higher proportion of pensioners in poverty (receiving pension credit) than the England average (Slough: 17.35%, England: 10.81%).

9.7% of residents aged 65 and over were unpaid carers (compared to 8.2% of residents aged 16-64).

4,055 (26.5%) residents aged 65 and over live alone (compared to 7.6% of residents aged 16-64).

- 19.6% of residents aged 65-69 live alone.
- 26.5% of residents aged 70-79 live alone.
- 34.6% of residents aged 80-89 live alone.
- 58.5% of residents aged 90+ live alone.

Older people: protected characteristics

The following protected characteristics data is for older people in Slough aged 65 and over (and comparisons) from the <u>2021 Census</u>.

Sex

53.1% were female and 46.9% were male.

This is compared to:

- Slough residents aged 0-64: 50.2% female and 49.8% male.
- England aged 65 and over: 54.2% female and 45.8% male.

Disability

36.3% of Slough residents aged 65 and over were disabled under the Equality Act.

This is compared to:

- Slough aged 0-64: 8.7%
- England aged 65 and over: 35.2%


Economic activity

86.4% were economically inactive (England: 89%).

91.2% of economically inactive residents were retired.



Slough has a larger proportion of residents aged 65 and over from Asian ethnic groups than England, and a smaller proportion from White ethnic groups.





Slough has a smaller proportion of Christian older residents and older residents with no religion than England, and a larger proportion of Muslim, Sikh, and Hindu older residents.



Adults with limiting health conditions or disability

In 2021, there were 15,982 residents aged 18 and over who were disabled (under the Equality Act) (14% of residents aged 18+).

5,563 residents aged 18+ were not disabled (under the Equality Act) but had a long-term physical or mental health condition that did not limit their day-to-day activities (5% of residents aged 18+).

5.14% of Slough households receive the limited capability for work entitlement of Universal Credit, which is just below the England average (5.6%).

Slough's healthy life expectancy is 58.1 for male residents and 60.3 for female residents, which is several years lower than England (M: 63.1 and F: 63.9).



































Barriers: digital exclusion

Slough has a lower risk of digital exclusion compared to the England average, but there is still risk.

Slough's Digital Exclusion Risk Index (DERI) score in 2021 was 2.74.

- This was lower than the England average (3.00), and slightly lower than the South East average (2.77), but higher than the Berkshire average (2.50).
- 16 of Slough's 21 wards had higher risk than the Berkshire average.
- 3 wards had higher risk than the England average (Chalvey: 3.16, Manor Park & Stoke: 3.22, and Wexham Court: 3.14).

- Slough's DPI was higher than for the South East (94.6%) and England (94.2%).



71% of Slough's Lower-tier Super Output Areas (LSOAs) fall below the national average of the IMD.

There are particularly severe pockets of deprivation in Britwell, Chalvey, Herschel Park, Elliman, Wexham Court, and Colnbrook & Poyle.





IoD: barriers to housing and services

Slough is much more deprived than the England average for barriers to housing and services in the 2019 indices of deprivation and the wider barriers subdomain (which included overcrowding, homelessness, housing affordability).

51% of LSOAs in Slough fell within the most deprived 10% of LSOAs across England for barriers to housing and services.

61% of Slough LSOAs fell within the most deprived 10% in England for wider barriers.

Household Deprivation

The ONS used the 2021 census data to classify household deprivation based on four dimensions: education, employment, health & disability, and housing. <u>This article</u> contains their definitions of these four dimensions.

Household deprivation

57.7% of Slough households were deprived in one or more dimension in the 2021 census.

- 36.6% were deprived in only 1 dimension.
- 16.4% were deprived in 2 dimensions.
- 4.7% were deprived in 3 or 4 dimensions.

Of the four dimensions:


- 21% of households were deprived in the education dimension.
- 14% of households were deprived in the employment dimension.
- 27% of households were deprived in the health and disability dimension.
- 21% of households were deprived in the housing dimension.

39% of residents aged 16+ living in deprived households were economically inactive.

Of those that were economically inactive and members of a deprived household:

- 34% were retired.
- 17% were students
- 23% were looking after home or family.
- 12% were long-term sick or disabled.
- 13% had other reasons for inactivity.

6% of residents aged 5+ and living in deprived households were unpaid carers.

Ethnicity

Percentage of residents living in deprived households, separated by broad ethnic group:

• Asian ethnic groups: 46%

• Black ethnic groups: 8%

• Mixed or multiple: 4%

• White ethnic groups: 36%

• Other ethnic groups: 6%

The 5 largest detailed ethnic groups in deprived households were:

1. Asian: Pakistani: 24.5% of residents in deprived households

2. White: English, Welsh, Scottish, Northern Irish, or British: 24.1%

3. Asian: Indian: 15.2%

4. White: Other*: 11.2%

5. Black: African: 5.3%
