Section 9 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and Regulation 22 of the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996.

THE BOROUGH OF SLOUGH (A4 SECTION 5 FARNHAM ROAD TO HIGH STREET SLOUGH) (NO. 2) EXPERIMENTAL BUS LANE ORDER 2020 (Order 59 of 2020) ('Order')

1. SLOUGH BOROUGH COUNCIL gives notice that on 20th November 2020 it made an experimental Order under section 9 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 ("the Act") and any other enabling powers.
2. The effects of the Order will be to introduce experimental bus lanes at the following locations:-
 - Bath Road, Slough (eastbound)** - various locations between the junctions with Farnham Road and High Street, Slough
 - Bath Road, Slough (westbound)** – various locations between the junctions with High Street, Slough, and Montem Lane
 - High Street, Slough (both directions)** – between the junctions with Burlington Road and Bath Road. (see point 5 for more information)
3. The bus lanes will operate from Monday to Friday during the hours of 7am-10am and 3pm-7pm. They will restrict the use of the nearside traffic lane to the following vehicles:-
 - buses
 - pedal cycles
 - solo motorcycles
 - taxis
 - private hire vehicles ("minicabs") operated under licences issued by Slough Borough Council
 - zero emission vehicles displaying green number plates under a forthcoming scheme
 - electric scooters hired from Neuron Mobility under a government trial scheme
4. The Order will come into operation on 4th December 2020 for a period not extending beyond the end of February 2022.
5. A copy of the Order as made, plans showing the parts of the highway affected and a statement of the Council's reasons for making the Order may be inspected on the Council's website at www.slough.gov.uk and then enter 'public notices' in the search engine..
6. The Council will be considering in due course whether to replace this experimental Order with a permanent Order having the same effects. Anyone wishing to object to such a permanent Order may do so within six months of the day on which the experimental Order came into force. Any such objection must be made in writing, stating the grounds on which it is made, and be sent to the address below or emailed to tfs@slough.gov.uk.
7. Any person wishing to question the validity of the Order, or of any provision contained in it, on the grounds that it is not within the powers conferred by the Act, or that any requirement of the Act or of any

regulations made under the Act has not been complied with may, within 6 weeks from the date on which the Order was made, apply to the High Court for that purpose.
